SCHOOL COMMUNITY

Carlmont, a California Distinguished School, is a four-year comprehensive public high school in the Sequoia Union High School District and fully accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). We are located on 42 acres in the Belmont-San Carlos Hills about 30 miles south of San Francisco and north of San Jose.

There are 2133 students enrolled in 2017-2018 school year across 9th – 12th grades. Our students come from Belmont, San Carlos, Redwood City, Redwood Shores and East Palo Alto communities with approximate race/ethnic background: 52% White, 25% Asian, 17.5% Latino, 2.5% African-American, 2.6% Pacific Islander, and .4% Native American.

CURRICULUM HIGHLIGHTS

- Carlmont offers a wide range of extracurricular activities to students. Our athletic program includes 42 teams in 15 different sports, with 650-700 students participating as well as more than 115 clubs, such as, Christian Club, Cinematic Arts, Gender & Sexuality Alliance, etc.
- Multi-year Biotechnology Institute program with a new two-story, high-tech lab facility.
- 8 sections of Advancement via Individual Determination (AVID) Program.
- Robotics Team attended two regional and one world championship, advancing to finals in regional, winning spirit awards in both regional competition.
- Nearly 450 students participate in 10 different choir and orchestra/band choices held daily that develop a 14-event schedule of sell-out performances.
- Carlmont offers 11 visual arts classes serving more than 590 students. The school also offers 4 drama classes in addition to multiple extracurricular groups supported by students.
- Carlmont's journalism students publish a 16-page newspaper and also maintain an online news site at scotscoop.com. Top awards received: NSPA, Press Women, School Newspapers Online
- Class of 2017 had 8 National Merit Finalists and 5 National Merit Winners. The Class of 2018 has 9 Semifinalists.

CLASS OF 2018 GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

A total of 220 credits are required in the following subject areas: English = 4 years (40 credits); Math = 2 years (20 credits); Science = 2 years (20 credits); Social Science = 3.5 years (35 credits); Fine Art = 1 year (10 credits); Career Tech Ed = 1 year (10 credits); P.E. = 2 years (20 credits); and Electives (62.5 credits); Life Skills (2.5 credits)
