SCHOOL COMMUNITY

Carlmont, a California Distinguished School public, is a four-year comprehensive high school in the Sequoia Union High School District and fully accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). We are located on 42 acres in the Belmont-San Carlos Hills about 30 miles south of San Francisco and north of San Jose.

There are 2192 students enrolled in 2014-2015 school year across 9th – 12th grades. Our students come from Belmont, San Carlos, Redwood City, Redwood Shores and East Palo Alto communities with approximate race/ethnic background: 55% White, 20% Asian, 17% Latino, 3% African-American, 3% Pacific Islander, and 1% Native American.

CURRICULUM HIGHLIGHTS

- Carlmont offers a wide range of extracurricular activities to students. Our athletic program includes 42 teams in 15 different sports, with 650-700 students participating as well as more than 50 clubs, such as, Christian Club, Model UN Club, Gay-Straight Alliance, etc.
- Multi-year Biotechnology Lab program in new two-story, modern (high-tech) lab facility.
- Business Technology Academy and Advancement via Individual Determination (AVID) Programs.
- Earned local, regional, and nationally rankings in the American Math Contest program.
- Nearly 450 students participate in 11 different choir and orchestra/band classes held daily that develop a 14-event schedule of sell-out performances.
- Carlmont offers 22 visual arts classes serving more than 650 students. The school also offers three drama classes in addition to multiple extracurricular groups supported by students.
- Carlmont's journalism students publish a 16-page newspaper and also maintain an online news site at scotscoop.com. The dedicated yearbook staff created an award-winning yearbook.
- Oracle Certification program offered to students in Computer Science.
- Class of 2015 includes 6 seniors eligible to compete as National Merit Semi-Finalists and 2 seniors eligible to compete in 2015 National Achievement Scholarship Program.

A total of 220 credits are required in the following subject areas: English = 4 years (40 credits); Math = 2 years (20 credits); Science = 2 years (20 credits); Social Science = 3.5 years (35 credits); Fine Art = 1 year (10 credits); Career Tech Ed = 1 year (10 credits); P.E. = 2 years (20 credits); and Electives (65 credits).
